Overview of ESS Workshop Sessions:

May 29, 2013 Wednesday (Teaching Focus, 4-5:30pm and 7-8:30pm)

Expanding Research in the Areas of Teaching and Extension. The interdisciplinary subject matter available in equine studies together with increasing interest in outcome, engagement, and impact assessment lead to opportunities for broadening research in the areas of Teaching and Extension. Many institutions now require impact assessment and/or engagement assessment of teaching and extension activities. This requirement

can actually produce information that could be developed into research publications. In addition, increased attention to business efficiency, production management, and cost controls lend themselves to areas of new focus for teaching and extension research. A host of other untapped opportunities abound. The aim of this workshop is to have an interactive discussion that generates new ideas about how current and future teaching and extension activities may result in projects suitable for conference submissions, tenure and promotion portfolios, competitive grants, as well as undergraduate and graduate research projects. This session is anticipated to include a short IRB overview for those interested in the area of Human Subjects Research.

Are we seen as experts beyond our traditional audiences? Increasingly, a multitude of topics regarding horses and the horse industry are in the popular press and main stream political conversations. Unfortunately, sound scientific methodology is often unavailable or absent from arguments that present a negative image of those whose livelihoods revolve around horses and the horse industry. To what extent do our professional positions as Teachers, Researchers, and Extension Specialists call upon us to be experts beyond the Academy and also serve as an interface with Media, Elected Officials and Regulatory bodies, and Industry Stakeholders – particularly when 'bad science', 'faulty interpretation', and/or 'misrepresentation of facts' are of concern? This session will be a moderated discussion in order to glean a sense of conference participant's responses to the question: Are we perceived as experts beyond our traditional audience?

May 30, 2013 Thursday (Extension Focus) 4:00 -7:00 p.m.

Part A- A Then and Now Look at Equine Teaching and Extension. A lot of changes have taken place in higher education and the equine industry over the last few decades. These changes include everything from research developments and regulatory guidance to huge advancements in educational technology. Along this road of discovery we have learned a lot about what works and doesn't work for educators; as well as developed ideas and theories to test what might work in the areas of equine teaching and extension. The aim of this workshop section is to have an interactive discussion that reviews were we have come from to where we are now regarding how we assist with and educate our equine clients.

Part B - Future of Equine Teaching and Extension Delivery. The continual advancements in technology provides educators with a vast menu for presenting and disseminating information to a few or mass population of people anywhere in the world. The question that is posed in this section is "Where are we positioned as educators to utilize these advancements and are we going to meet our client's educational needs?" To address this question discussion could focus on the following areas: How is higher education viewed? Is higher education a valued product? Are our professional positions as Teachers, Researchers, and Extension Specialists valued beyond Academia? Are we the major source for equine related information? Is the information we share viewed as current, pertinent and easily assessable? Are we serving the needs of our clients or more of the academic community? This session will be a moderated discussion in order to obtain a sense of conference participant's responses to the questions and possible approaches to insure we provide a high quality educational service to our clients.

Part C - Successfully Using eXtension Horse in Research, Classroom Teaching and Extension. eXtension is an interactive learning environment delivering the best, most researched knowledge from the best land-grant university minds across America. This workshop section will focus more on individual's needs and interests in learning how researchers and educators are incorporating eXtension Horse services and online educational resources in research grants, teaching, Extension programming and social media. Workshop participants will be able to receive one-on-one assistance with how to use eXtension resources and how to become more involved with eXtension.
